Who: Swedish club members & friends as well as prospective club members


What to bring: snacks/drinks and/or a picnic lunch

Applications for the Swedish Club of Houston's 2003 Lucia are now being accepted. Our 2003 Lucia will be presented at the Swedish Christmas Traditions and Lucia Procession scheduled for Saturday, December 13, 2003 at Immanuel Lutheran Church, 306 E. 15th St., Houston, TX.

Candidates must be young women between the ages of 16 and 24, who are members of the club. Club membership can be either individual or as part of a family membership. They must be able to attend the Swedish Traditions program on December 13, and must be able to represent the Club at a celebration and parade in Barkeryd, Sweden on Sunday, August 2, 2004. Round-trip airfare for our 2003 Lucia will be provided from Chicago to Sweden. The Lucia is responsible for her own ground or air transportation to and from Chicago. On her return to Houston, the Lucia must write an article for publication in The Swedish Club News about her experience in Sweden.

Participants are also needed for the Lucia procession. The procession is made up of female attendants, ages 5-20 and star boys, ages 5-15. Attendants and star boys wear all white clothing with silver trim and accessories. The club can provide some articles of clothing, but individuals are encouraged to provide their own.

For sixteen years the Lucia program has provided a wonderful way to travel and learn about our Swedish ancestry and our Texas connection with Barkeryd, Sweden. As an ambassador of the Club, our Lucia will be in a parade and send greetings to the people of Barkeryd from The Swedish Club of Houston.

Swedish National Day Speech by Jan Dryselius Consul of Sweden in Houston

As Consul of Sweden for Texas, it is my pleasure to give you an official welcome to this Celebration of Swedish National Day. It is great to see so many true Swedes here. I hope you will enjoy all the traditional food and decorations.

Swedish National Day is June 6 but since it has yet to become an official Swedish holiday as it is scheduled to be in 2005, we, and most of our countrymen in America, are using today, the closest Saturday, as the best possible date to commemorate the day.

June 6 is an important date in Swedish history. On this day in 1523 Gustav Vasa was elected king of the entire territory we today call Sweden. This all took place in Strängnäs as, unfortunately the Danes were occupying Stockholm. Gustaf Vasa wasted precious time with the Danes entering Stockholm only three weeks later. My type of guy! Also On this date in 1809 Sweden's first written constitution was ratified. It was at that time second only to the US constitution which remains the oldest functioning constitution in the world. Our modern constitution of 1973 is based on the 1809 charter so I think it quite appropriate to maintain that our constitution retains its distinction as the second oldest constitution. But 110 years ago Arthur Hazelius, the founder of Skansen, Stockholm's wonderful open air museum, arranged a huge spring party, which he dubbed "Swedish Flag Day" that lasted for four days ending on June 6, to spot-light this historically important date. At first this was basically a local celebration tied to Stockholm and environs but as interest and enthusiasm grew it spread across Sweden and finally evolving in 1983 into what we now know as Sweden's National Day.

So, Happy Birthday! It's our 20th!

Curiously enough today also happens to be the official date when the union between Sweden and Norway was dissolved anno 1905. (Did we know there was oil there?). . . nevertheless, both countries appear satisfied with the way things turned out.

The "Norwegian Seaman's Church" and the "Church of Sweden Abroad" continue to show the common bond of yesteryear caring for our respective maritime souls and local sinners. So in some areas we still stand united.

Åge and Gerd, I wish to thank you and the rest of your staff for your kind hospitality. Please, everyone, put your hands together and as we say "show your love and appreciation" .It is extremely difficult to leave your homeland. Every thing from 'back home' becomes more vivid – more important. One is never more Swedish than when 'utomlands'.

SAS, IKEA, Tetra Pak, Alfa Laval, Volvo, Hasselblad, SAAB, SKF and Ericsson are but a few of the well known names, nay beloved symbols of Swedish ingenuity. How about those Absolut ads? And all of you, I'm sure, visited the Museum of Natural Science exhibition of the Vikings and saw even more impressive reminders of your heritage. And perhaps you spent some time viewing the most recent Nobel exhibit celebrating the first 100 years of the Nobel Foundation.

Or the pair of 5200 year old skiis found outside the village of Kalyträsk in Norrland?

How about the zipper, the refrigerator, and the wrench? The seat belt, ATM, computer mouse, and telephone receiver, paper clip, matches – made out of wood - of course, it was even a Swede, keeping in mind the lovely ladies, who designed the curves of the almighty Coca-Cola bottle!

So, here we are. Away from Sweden ready to celebrate National Day with others of same heart. We relish the traditions, the friendships and salute Sweden.I want to thank Nina Björk, my intern at the Consulate, her determination, enthusiasm, research and other contributions in making this all possible. Last but certainly not least, I want to thank Mary, my wife, who supports me Tirelessly, putting up with all my quirks and idiosyncrasies. Thank you for all the hours you always put in and nobody sees but me!

So now, show your love and appreciation for these and all others who Contributed to make this celebration possible today in our usual loud and vociferous fashion a fyrfaldigt leve!


