Voting in Swedish Elections

Elections to the riksdag, the municipalities and to the county councils will be held this fall in Sweden.

Swedes living abroad remain in the electoral register, and thereby maintain their right to vote, for ten years after their emigration is officially recorded in the national register. After 10 years, a written notification must be submitted to the Swedish National Tax Board (*Skatteverket*) to retain the right to vote for an additional ten-year period.

The completed notification form must be received by the National Tax Board at least 30 days before the election date. The form must be mailed to the National Tax Board at the following address:

If the notification has not been received 30 days before the election date, Swedes abroad who are not in the electoral register may still have the opportunity to vote. A vote received from abroad by mail or by a Swedish foreign mission will still be counted, if it has reached the Election Authority by 12:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Church of Sweden Abroad

The first pastor of the Swedish Church of Florida, Olof Olsson, was inaugurated on December 6, 2009, in St. Martin's Episcopal Church, Pompano Beach. The Swedish Church in Florida will not be housed in a specific location but will use other church sites in order to work with Swedes all over Florida and neighboring states. It is one of 45 Swedish Churches abroad and is the closest to Texas.

The church has its own choir, with soloists and a pianist/organist, and will hold worship services once a month in each of two existing churches—St. Martin's Episcopal in Pompano Beach and St. Immanuel Lutheran in Miami.

Pastor Olsson, whose area of responsibility stretches even to Texas, has visited Texas before and is planning to come again to hold services here. We are waiting to hear from him a little later about where and when.

SVT World

A letter came recently from SVT (Sveriges Television AB) to the consulate in Houston announcing that SVT World, the international channel of the Swedish public service broadcaster Sveriges Television (SVT) is now available via IPTV (digital TV via Internet) in the USA and Canada.

SVT World broadcasts mainly Swedish-produced programs from all domestic SVT channels. The aim in planning the programming is to give SVT World viewers the chance to see all programs SVT has the right to broadcast outside Sweden. The basic rule is that the programs have to be shown at the same time as they are broadcast in Sweden, which is in Central European Time (CET).

Each package contains 1.75 lbs. of fish and costs \$7.99 per package. The fish is sold under the Olsen Fish Company brand, which obtains and imports it from Ålesund, Norway.

If you are interested, either check with the meat department at your local Randall's store for availability or contact Joanne Ashland at 281-830-2448, and she will help you get it from the Clear Lake or South Shore Harbour stores.

As a side note for the future, for anyone who really likes *lutefisk*, Joanne says there is a *lutefisk* dinner in Cranfills Gap, TX, near Waco, on the first Saturday of December. Also, *lutefisk* may be purchased at the Norwegian Seaman's Church in Pasadena during their bazaar the second weekend of November each year.

News from New Sweden Centre

The New Sweden Centre of Wilmington, Delaware, has recently updated their web page, www.colonialnewsweden.org. If you haven't checked it recently, there are many things that should be of interest to anyone interested in Swedish Heritage in America.

Of special interest to anyone who may be planning to visit the Delaware Valley is our brochure that lists 29 New Sweden sites, museums and landmarks. This brochure is available on the web site by clicking on the words "new brochure" in the text on the home page.

We also have a video page with Swedish Dancers and someone playing a Nyckelharpa, as well as some great links to many of the organizations listed on the brochure.

News from Sweden (from Swedish Council of America's February 2010 *eUPDATE*)

- → Sweden's Royal Academy of Sciences has awarded American scientist Walter Munk the 2010 Crafoord Prize in Geosciences for his research on ocean circulation. The 92-year-old will receive the 4 million kronor prize (about \$560,000) at a ceremony in Stockholm on May 11 in the presence of Sweden's King Carl XVI Gustaf. The academy announced that Munk received the award "for his pioneering and fundamental contributions to our understanding of ocean circulation, tides and waves, and their role in the Earth's dynamics." Munk was born in Austria but moved to the U.S. in 1932. He became professor of Geophysics at the University of California, San Diego, in 1954. The Crafoord award has been given annually since 1982 for scientific research in areas not covered by the Nobel Prizes.
- → Four households in Washington D.C. are acting as Climate Pilots during the next eight months. They are committed to making a difference by finding real everyday solutions to climate change and in this way serve as an example for others. The project is a collaboration between the City of Kalmar in Sweden and the Embassy of Sweden in Washington. You can follow them on their journey at www.climatepilots.wordpress.com.
- → Sweden is set to undergo a territorial expansion following a government decision recently which will alter the border with Finland to Sweden's advantage. The move will expand Sweden's territory by a few hectares, based on an agreement with Sweden's neighbor to the east.

Places to go and things to see . . .

Philadelphia, PA (through May 2, 2010) - The American Swedish Historical Museum will present the print work of Stockholm artists Rachelle Puryear and Lars Nyberg in an exhibit titled, "Printscapes: Impressions of Nature." Puryear creates colorful screen-printed patterns that originate from her impressions of nature. In contrast, Nyberg's black and white drypoints depicting Swedish winters appear

sparsely drawn, but each image erupts with detail upon closer investigation. This exhibit is an opportunity to learn about the diverse realm of printmaking through the work of two insightful and skilled printmakers. For more information, visit www.americanswedish.org or call 215-389-1776.

Minneapolis, MN (through May 30, 2010) - The American Swedish Institute will feature the work of seventeen contemporary Swedish designers—all young, progressive women. - ► US 290W towards Austin
- ➤ Turn left onto O'Malley Rd. (The turn off 290 comes up fast and is easy to miss. When 290W and 36N make the split with a sharp 270 degree right turn, drive 2.0 miles further on 290W, then make the left onto O'Malley Rd.)
- ► Turn left onto CR-29/Lange Lake Rd.
- ► Turn right onto CR-25/Old Mill Creek Rd.
- Turn left onto CR-2/Beckerman Rd.
- Turn right onto Peters Ln. and stop at 3383
- Drive through the gate and up to parking by the ranch.
