BITS & PIECES

 Did you know? Coca-Cola's iconic, rosy-cheeked Santa Claus has a Swedish connection. Illustrator Haddon Sundblom (1899–1976) was the Michigan-born son of immigrants from Sweden and the Åland Islands, an autonomous, Swedish-speaking territory of Finland. In the 1920s, The Coca-Cola Company began experimenting with adopting Santa as a salesman for the idea that "thirst knows no season." A number of artists tried their hand at illustrating Santa, but in 1931 Sundblom's version became etched in people's minds worldwide as the definitive characterization of Santa. Between 1931 and 1964, Sundblom produced one or more Santa Claus paintings each year for The Coca-Cola Company.

 SCH member Gudrun Sundquist sent a link for another Texas-Sweden connection, <http://www.nrk.no/nett-tv/indeks/241685/> (in Norwegian and Swedish). Björn Herlin has opened a Jim Reeves Museum in Voxna, Hälsingland, in Sweden. Reeves (1923-1964) was from Panola County, Texas, and was a very popular country and pop music singer/songwriter in the 1950s and 1960s. He also gained a wide international following before he died at age 40 in a private airplane crash. Herlin's museum stores unique pictures, documents, interesting readings and private belongings of Reeves. For more information (primarily in Swedish), see jimreeves.se. Christmas Traditions and Luciadagen 2010

Once again, The Swedish Club hosted a wonderful Christmas Traditions and Lucia Celebration. The event was held Saturday, December 11, at Christ the King Lutheran Church with about 150 guests in attendance.

The Service of the Word began with a beautiful prelude of Swedish Christmas songs and carols played by organist, Howard Maple. After Club president, Cathy Wahren, welcomed the guests and narrated The Legend of Lucia, The Reverend Dr. Charles Millikan officiated. Vocalists, Veronica Butler and Howard Phillips, led the audience in singing traditional Swedish

Christmas songs, *När juldagsmorgen glimmar, Nu tändas tusen juleljus* and *Gläns över sjö och strand*.

Then the sanctuary lights dimmed, and Lucia Carrie Anderson led the candle-lit procession down the aisle as everyone sang *Sankta Lucia*. Carrie was accompanied by 16 starboys and attendants, one of whom was her sister, Claire. After the procession



gathered at the front of the sanctuary, Lucia co-chair, Margaret St.Clair, introduced Carrie while co-chair Linda Andersson placed a

pewter Lucia necklace around her neck. Then, with candles still lit, all sang *Stilla natt* before recessing.

After the service, everyone adjourned to Parish Hall for the Reception which was chaired by Jo Anna Harlan and Devon Westerlund. The Hall was beautifully decorated. There were poinsettias in the windows. The tables were festively decorated with red tablecloths,

topped with candle-lit centerpieces made from fresh greenery. The fresh evergreen Christmas tree was decorated Swedish-style with lights, small Swedish flags, straw ornaments and *Julgranskarameller* (colorful tissue-covered tubes containing candy).

As guests entered the Hall, various shopping venues awaited them. The bazaar sold traditional Swedish items. The Bake Sale offered Swedish breads and cookies. At another table, gently used Swedish books were sold. Also offered for sale was Scandinavian *rosmåling* made by local artist, Joyce Calderon. And to complete the shopping extravaganza, The Swedish Club sold club t-shirts.

Guests also had the opportunity to participate in another type of "shopping" opportunity: they were invited to purchase raffle tickets. Several lovely items

During the reception, Lucia Carrie and her family were introduced. In attendance were her parents, Rod

and Jackie, her sister Claire and her grandparents. Carrie's Swedish roots are on her father's side, with her great-grandparents emigrating from Sweden about a hundred years ago and settling in South Dakota.

News from Sweden (from Swedish Council of America's November and December 2010 eUPDATES)

- For the second straight year, Sweden has topped the rankings of a study evaluating the countries with the world's best policies that benefit the developing world. The CDI (Commitment to Development Index) measures national efforts in different areas that are important to developing countries such as aid, trade, investment, migration, environment, security and technology. Sweden has even improved since last year's first place finish, scoring particularly highly in the aid, migration, trade and environment categories.
- Crown Princess Victoria and her husband Prince Daniel have finally moved into their new home in Haga Castle, located just outside of Stockholm. The castle had been under renovation for several months, and was finished last summer. The move was delayed until November due to the Crown Princess's many travels and tight working schedule. The cost of the renovation of Haga Castle came to a total of 7 million dollars.
- On Sunday, the 14th of November, after a meeting with district chairs, Mona Sahlin told reporters that she will not run for re-election as party chair at the special congress in March. Mona Sahlin has led the Social Democrats since 2007, when she became their first female leader, and will continue to lead until spring. There have been no predictions of who will succeed her. "It's time for others to have a chance," she said.
- Swedish actor Mikael Persbrandt has landed a role in the film version of J.R.R. Tolkien's book "The Hobbit," a prequel to the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy. 47-year-old Persbrandt, perhaps best known for his role as Gunvald Larsson in the Martin Beck detective films, will be the latest of a string of Swedish actors making the step to Hollywood. "The Hobbit" is set to have its U.S. premiere in December 2012.
- Stockholm is forecast to experience its coldest temperatures in over 100 years as winter weather takes hold of the country, according to the Swedish Meteorological Institute. Temperatures across the country were expected to drop to record lows (with

the exception of the far north), with averages coming in 7-10 degrees Celsius (13-18 degrees F.) below normal. "It is far below average temperatures, which usually oscillate around freezing at this time of the year," said Alexandra Ohlsson, a meteorologist with SMHI.

Embassy in DC named Best Embassy

The Embassy of Sweden has been named Best Embassy of 2010 in Washington, DC, by the 300,000 readers of the Washington Post Express. Of the 180 other embassies, Brazil was awarded second place, while the Embassy of France came in third.

The annual "Best of" competition allows the general public to vote for their favorites in a number of categories. The readers' reasons for choosing Sweden were that it is a fantastic, unusual and accessible embassy building but, most of all, because the embassy offers a very active and diverse program which is open to the public. The embassy is now in the midst of the 11th in a series of public diplomacy programs which encompass politics, culture, trade and research/science.

"Getting this award is extra special just now as we recently passed the 250,000 mark with visitors to the embassy programs. It also provides a confirmation that we have put Sweden on the map among Washingtonians," says proud Ambassador Jonas Hafström. "The work of my fantastic team continues to reap success following 2008 when the embassy and House of Sweden were declared Venue of the Year by the Washington Post."

Swedish driver's license renewal

If you need to renew your Swedish Driver's Licence, please contact the consulate for more information. New rules apply as of December 1, 2010.
