- → Swedish archaeologists remain busy throughout Sweden as new roads and building projects are developing. Recently, a team working in western Sweden uncovered 1700-year-old artifacts in an area which once connected the sea to inland lakes. - → The Swedish National Seismic Network, located at Uppsala University, reported that an earthquake measuring between 4.5 and 5.0 on the Richter scale rocked southern Sweden on December 16, 2008. The epicenter was located about 30 kilometers east of Malmö. This was likely the biggest earthquake to hit Sweden since 1904. - → <u>VisitSweden.com</u> and its included site <u>CommunityOfSweden.com</u> were named the Best Website in Sweden for 2008 by <u>Internetworld</u>, a newspaper in Sweden. - → Stockholm rolled out the red carpet for visitors from around the globe during early December to celebrate Nobel Week 2008. Events included lectures, connected to the subject for which the prize is awarded, given by all laureates. The highlight of the week was the award ceremony and gala banquet on December 10, the anniversary of Nobel's death.

Chicago, IL: January 16 - March 15, 2009, the Swedish American Museum Center will promote Scandinavian culture and the appreciation of art through the quarterly-rotating exhibit, "Colors of Nature: Oils and Watercolors," by Siv Lindgren. Lindgren was born in Kalix, Sweden, where she was first inspired by her artistic mother and the natural beauty of her homeland. At age 17, Lindgren immigrated to Chicago in order to work with her aunt at a prestigious dress-making shop on Michigan Avenue and attend the Art Institute of Chicago. The beauty of rural Sweden is the foundation for Lindgren's love of nature and is reflected in her paintings of flowers and Swedish and American cities and landscapes. Minneapolis, MN: The exhibit "Radiant Knits: The Bohus Tradition" will be on display at the American Swedish Institute from January 23 - March 29, 2009. The exhibit focuses on the history of the Swedish Bohus style of knitting and the Bohus Knitting industry (1939-1969), and features original couture garments knitted in the Bohus style, built around Susanna Hansson's collection of vintage garments. This will be the first time that Bohus garments have been on exclusive exhibit in the U.S. since the 1964 World's Fair in New York. The exhibit is included with museum admission: \$6 adults, \$5 ages 62+, \$4 ages 6-18 and students. The American Swedish Institute is located at 2600 Park Ave. in Minneapolis. Seattle, WA: From February 6 - April 5, 2009, the Nordic Heritage Museum will welcome the exhibition "Knitting Along the Viking Trail," featuring work by renowned Swedish knitting designer Elsebeth Lavold. The artist's inspiration for the exhibited pieces comes from the ornamentation of Viking-age relics, from small pieces of jewelry to monumental rock carvings to runic inscriptions. Senior Sawyers and Volunteers Create a Museum

During the summer of 2006, a group of the Senior Sawyers, volunteer carpenters at the Kalmar Nyckel shipyard, 1124 E. 7th Street, Wilmington, Delaware, worked on a major project renovating an old carving shop according to the exhibit concepts designed and planned by Aleasa Hogate, volunteer Education Director, to create the "Experience New Sweden" exhibit. What was once just an un-insulated, enclosed pole barn with a potbelly stove and shop lights was completely gutted and turned into an attractive museum room. The room is now completely insulated, paneled in a warm golden natural wood and provides a perfect setting for the small but all- inclusive museum on the early history of the first permanent European Colony in the Delaware Valley, New Sweden history in a nutshell.

The "Experience New Sweden" exhibit project was a major undertaking for the entirely volunteer New Sweden Centre organization. Dedicated June 16, 2007, the exhibit is currently open by appointment only but provides an excellent starting place for anyone interested in learning about this nearly forgotten era of early American colonial history.

Volunteers from New Sweden Centre welcome your visits and will be happy to give you a tour. In the "Touch History" section of the museum, children of all ages can enjoy trying out colonial games from the 17th century. Colonial clothing is also available for young children to try on to see what they would be wearing if they lived in Delaware Valley in the 1600's, presenting a great photo opportunity.

Aleasa Hogate and others created an interior corner of a log cabin with a corner Swedish fireplace scene with a 17th century homemaker mannequin. "Explore New Sweden" panels highlight other sites to visit in the area. As part of your visit, you may view the "Life in New Sweden" video.

- ♦ Everlasting Moments (Maria Larssons eviga ögonblick), directed by Academy Award-nominated film maker Jan Troell and starring Maria Heiskanen, Mikael Persbrandt and Jesper Christensen, has been nominated for the 2009 Golden Globes, and chosen to compete for the Oscar nomination in the category Best Foreign Language Film of 2008. Based on the real-life account of Troell's wife's grandmother, the film takes us through the life of Maria Larsson in early 20th-century Sweden. She is a young working-class mother, married to an abusive alcoholic, who wins a camera in a lottery. Her decision to keep it alters her whole life; photography grants her renewed passion, intellectual independence, and new eyes with which to see the world.
- ♣ Eton of Sweden, one of the world's finest shirt makers, is set to open its first exclusive brand store in the U.S. at one of New York's most treasured landmarks, The Plaza, on January 20. Eton was founded as a small family business in the Swedish town of Gånghester in 1928. Today, it remains a family-owned company that combines cutting-edge fashion and technology with traditional values and handcrafting. Eton Shirts are available in exclusive brand stores and men's departments in more than 35 countries worldwide.
- Henrik Ibsen's classic *Hedda Gabler* has been adapted by Christopher Shinn and directed by Ian Rickson, with a cast featuring Peter Stormare and Mary-Louise Parker. Previews began on January 6 at American Airlines Theatre in New York. Opening night is January 25 with a limited engagement through March 29. Peter Stormare is one of Sweden's most accomplished actors. He has performed leading roles in *Long Day's Journey Into Night, Miss Julie, King Lear* and *Hamlet* under the direction of the legendary Ingmar Bergman. More recently, he has performed in several Hollywood films alongside actors such as Nicole Kidman, Matt Damon, Chloë Sevigny and Willem Dafoe.

Raoul Wallenberg remembered in January (from Swedish Council of America's January 2008 "eUPDATE")

The Raoul Wallenberg Committee of the United States, an affiliate of Swedish Council of America, acknowledges two important dates in January. On January 17th, 1945, Raoul Wallenberg was arrested by Soviet troops, never to be seen again. In addition, January 27th is the International Holocaust Remembrance Day, as designated by the United Nations General Assembly.

Near the end of World War II, a 31-year-old Swedish businessman, Raoul Wallenberg, volunteered to leave the safety of his neutral homeland and travel to war-torn Budapest to save the lives of Jews threatened by the Nazis. Hungary had the largest remaining Jewish community left in Nazi-occupied Europe. Through the use of forged protective passports of his own design, Swedish safe houses, and his influence on

political authorities in many spheres, he was able to save the lives of more than 100,000 Jews in six months. On January 17, 1945, Raoul Wallenberg was arrested by Soviet troops on unknown charges, and tragically disappeared into the prison system. His fate remains a mystery today.

For his heroic actions, the United States named Raoul Wallenberg an Honorary Citizen of the United States in 1981. He stands alongside Winston Churchill, the Marquis de Lafayette and Mother Teresa as one of only four persons to receive this honor. In April 1997, the U.S. Postal Service issued a stamp honoring Wallenberg's wartime heroism.
