My mother grew up in a Swedish-American church in Pennsylvania where they celebrated a Lucia Festival every December at Christmastime. She has told stories of the tradition to my sister and me our whole lives, but we have never had the first-hand experience of Lucia. Now that I am growing older, I am becoming more interested in my Swedish heritage. I am fascinated by the stories that my mother and grandmother tell of Lucia and of our Swedish relatives and traditions.

My grandmother tells stories of her childhood memories of them, and how they lived in rural Pennsylvania. Swedish Texans: Swedish Churches in Texas



Before the Civil War, there were approximately 150 Swedish Texans living in the state. After the war, three factors ushered in a larger wave of migration to the country and the state: The Homestead Act allowed immigrants free land if they became citizens. Sweden also experienced three years of bad harvest due to drought. And ticket fares to the New World via steamship were reduced dramatically due to better technology.

With the influx of new arrivals, the desire for central places to worship and meet became a priority within many Swedish communities in Texas. As the population grew, many new churches were built within the state. Most congregations were Lutheran but there were Methodist, Evangelical Free Church, and Baptist congregations as well.

Churches played an important role for many Swedish Texans. It gave people a place to gather and worship. It also helped keep the culture and language active. Many times, the services, Sunday school classes, and confirmation classes were all held in Swedish - which was the norm until the 1920s and 1930s. The church was also a central place to meet and socialize.

Several of the churches built in Texas are still standing with active congregations. Others have closed or changed location. Most moved into a more general direction away from their Swedish beginnings. At many of the original sites, you will also find historical markers set up by the <u>Texas Historical Commission</u> detailing the history of that particular church.

Of those that remain, some continue to honor their Swedish heritage. <u>Gethsemane Lutheran</u> in Austin holds a Christmas Eve service with Lucia celebrations and a Christmas morning Julotta at 8 am. <u>Bethel Evangelical Lutheran</u> in Avoca holds a Smörgåsbord every other February during even years. <u>St. John's United Methodist</u> in Georgetown holds a Swedish bake sale in October and conducts a Julotta at 6 am for Christmas. <u>New Sweden Evangelical Lutheran</u> in Manor holds both a Lucia celebration and a Julotta. <u>Tenth Street United</u> <u>Methodist</u> in Taylor also holds a Julotta every year.
